Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The third Benedictine vow is the vow for "conversion of life". We often think of a conversion experience as a powerful, personal commitment of one's life to Christ. While this is important, the Benedictine monk or nun goes further than that and seeks to live a daily life of conversion to Christ.

Conversion is therefore both the experience of a moment and an experience of a lifetime. The monks therefore make a lifetime vow to conversion of life. Every aspect of their day to day life involves the call to conversion. Their prayer, their study, their relationships—all influence the conversion of their whole lives to Christ.

The deepest meaning of conversion is not simply a personal religious experience, but the lifelong pursuit of total conversion and transformation into the image of Christ.

The need for conversion filters down into our family lives, school and parish lives so that God give us "conversion eyes" to see that he is working the work of transformation through all the daily events of life—all the joys and sorrows. We soon see that "conversion of life" means the whole of life is being converted.

It is important therefore to see that the three Benedictine vows of obedience, stability and conversion of life are braided together like a rope of three strands. Obedience strengthens stability and together they lead to a life that is converted, and a life that is being converted finds stability and obedience to be a joyful commitment not a burden.

One of the phrases I love best about the Rule of St Benedict is that he promises his monks that in the monastery there should be "nothing harsh, nothing burdensome". This gentle guidance came during a time in church history when there was a lot of guilt and subsequently much harsh asceticism. Benedict counters this with a rule that is wise, humane, merciful and kind.

I encourage you, if you want to deepen your own spiritual life to learn more about St Benedict's way of monastic wisdom. It will strengthen your relationship with the Lord and with one another.

MOTHER TERESA HOUSE

"A life not lived for others is not a life." Mother Teresa

I was recently invited to staff a leadership course and teach some sessions. In one, I allowed participants the opportunity to "break" their moral values through a series of rapid-fire games. It was not a competition, but participants assumed it was. When faced with delivering results or meeting deadlines, we often shortcut our morals and values and it is the example we set, especially for those in our families and at work. Crossing our moral line is a slippery slope that once crossed is hard to come up from as we keep moving our line. It is especially true of the people we work with at Mother Teresa House. None of them ever meant to be where they are, but often poor or easy choices in poor circumstances, led them to where they are.

In my debrief, we talked about the values we each wrote down earlier in the course and if their actions during the games matched those values. We are to be the examples, especially to youth, of making good moral decisions and to show them a path of right choices. Christ set the example for us. Leaders (parents, teachers, clergy, etc.) are the servants of those they lead. In Christ's example, "I came to serve, not to be served." I pray we can be that light to the world as we live a life for those around us.



40 Days for Life: You are invited to join other Christians throughout the Upstate to take part in our local 40 Days for Life effort from Sep. 25 - Nov. 3. The overturn of Roe and the S.C. Supreme Court's decision to uphold the Fetal Heartbeat Bill are signs of great hope for the end of abortion. However, abortions are still performed before a heartbeat is detected, for rape and incest, and fetal anomalies. We must continue to pray and draw attention to this human tragedy until life is protected from conception to natural death.

40 Days for Life is a prayer campaign to end abortion. This prayer campaign is initiated and organized at the grassroots level in communities throughout the nation and abroad.
